SIA Bids Farewell to **Gary Ryan**

Gary Ryan, 2006 – 2007 SIA President and Alberta EnviroFuels General Manager, is leaving the Strathcona County iso-octane plant and taking a new assignment as Manager, Operational Excellence and Process Safety Management with Chevron's Richmond Refinery, located near San Francisco.

"The Capital Region is facing significant industrial growth and I believe the SIA will continue to play a positive role in this development," says Ryan. "I have been very impressed with the collaborative relationship that exists between the SIA and our community partners. Working together, we have been able to bring about positive change in our focus areas of environmental monitoring, shared emergency response, community outreach and land use planning near heavy industry. My family and I have really enjoyed our time here in Sherwood Park and we will miss both the community and the many friends we have made."

Replacing Ryan at the Alberta EnviroFuels site is Les Barber, who was hired at the Alberta EnviroFuels site as part of the original startup and commissioning team in 1991. Les left AEF in 2004 to pursue other opportunities and is now returning as General Manager of the site and will be the company's SIA Board representative.

Chris Jager appointed new SIA President

Car Pooling Makes Dollars and Sense: **Petro-Canada Refinery Conversion Project**

With a projected workforce close to 4500 per day, the Petro-Canada Edmonton Refinery Oil Sands parking lot can be a busy place. To help minimize congestion on site and on the local roadways, the company has implemented a unique program to promote carpooling. Each time they carpool, construction contract workers are rewarded with tokens worth \$5.00 each. Based on a five-day work week, workers can earn up to \$25.00 which is then redeemed for an equivalent amount in Petro-Canada gas cards. Drivers and passengers are both rewarded - so everyone benefits from carpooling.

The project is a win-win. Aside from the monetary reward to workers, there is also decreased commuting time compared to a bussing alternative. Reduced traffic congestion benefits community neighbours and Petro-Canada alike. Project Manager Thor Solberg says, "This is a unique solution to an equally unique challenge of moving this number of workers from home to work on a day to day basis while trying to decrease congestion in the parking lot and surrounding transportation network. The gas card program is a great way to show to our workforce that we see real value in carpooling and that, if they can help out, they can share in the success."

SIA Ambient Air Quality Monitoring Network

Since 1979, the SIA has collectively operated an ambient air quality monitoring network that covers a 12 km² area in the east Edmonton and west Strathcona County region to:

- Monitor trends and changes in air quality
- Confirm effectiveness of emission control measures
- Assist with immediate investigation of unusual readings
- Collect and contribute data for scientific studies
- Provide air quality information to the community

Enbridge

Enbridge operates the world's longest crude oil and liquids pipeline system including Enbridge Pipelines Inc. and a variety of affiliated pipelines in Canada and the United States. These pipeline systems have operated for over 55 years and now comprise approximately 13,500 kilometres (8,500 miles) of pipeline, delivering more than 2 million barrels of crude oil and liquids per day.

Enbridge is currently going through significant growth and expansion of its pipeline and terminaling facilities in step with increasing oil sands production. Expansion of the company's upstream facilities includes the Waupisoo Pipeline, anticipated to come into service in mid-2008, along with various projects to serve our northern and central Alberta customers. Planned expansions to our mainline system will further broaden market access for Canadian petroleum products to eastern and central Canada and key US markets.

The Edmonton Terminal, located north of Baseline Road and east of 17th Street continues to expand with new facilities. Enbridge's Edmonton Terminal is the largest single owner tank farm in Canada. With 27 tanks ranging in size from 10,000 barrels to 390,000 barrels, it has a total capacity of approximately 4.8 million barrels on site.

The Edmonton Terminal employs 53 permanent staff, several long term contractors and summer students. Enbridge has a busy operation, yet focuses on keeping safety the number one priority each day. "We have excellent Environment, Health and Safety Management Systems that we are very proud of," says

John Hayes, General Manager, Western Region.

In keeping with their commitment to the environment, Enbridge adopted 3km of the north side of the highway within the Adopt-a-Highway program from north of Petro-Canada to the intersection of Baseline Road & 17 Street. Commitment to the communities in which the company has operations is also of utmost importance to Enbridge.

"We were delighted in 2007 to be the exclusive sponsor of the volunteer component of the Western Canada Summer Games held in Strathcona County," said John. "We extend our congratulations to the County, athletes, volunteers, and numerous supporters on the tremendous success of this event."

In addition Enbridge is proud to be involved in ongoing initiatives to protect public safety and the environment, including training, orientations and awareness programs. Enbridge works in close partnership with public officials, fellow SIA members, and emergency responders.

Enbridge owns and operates Canada's largest natural gas distribution company, Enbridge Gas Distribution, which provides gas to industrial, commercial and residential customers in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and New York State. Enbridge distributes gas to approximately 1.8 million customers.

Globally, the company employs more than 5,000 people, primarily in Canada, the U.S. and South America. Enbridge Inc. common shares trade on the Toronto Stock Exchange in Canada and on the

New York Stock Exchange in the U.S. under the symbol "ENB". Enbridge is proud to be one of only five Canadian companies ranked in the Global 100 Most Sustainable Corporations in the World.

In April, employees at Imperial's Strathcona refinery reached ten years without a lost time injury. The ten years represents nearly 8 million hours of work completed without a lost time injury.

To commemorate the safety milestone, Imperial made a contribution to the Job Safety Skills Society (JSSS). The JSSS, a registered not-for-profit organization in Edmonton, educates youth about workplace health and safety. JobSafe is an award winning program that delivers extensive school-based workplace safety-education and training. It is available to all publicly funded Alberta junior and senior high schools.

The JobSafe program was developed by safety professionals with first hand knowledge in health and safety issues and practices.

"Nothing is more important than the safety and health of our employees, our contractors and the people who live and work around our operations" says Tim Go, refinery manager. "Our goal is a workplace where 'Nobody Gets Hurt'. Our greatest safety achievements have been accomplished by every employee focusing their attention on safety fundamentals. This contribution is an investment in the next generation of workers, and an opportunity to help reduce injuries to youth in the workplace."

Five Points for Emergency Preparedness

1. Ensure a well-trained work force so that incidents are prevented.
2. Have emergency response teams on site, ready to respond to incidents.
3. Have a mutual assistance program in place between local emergency responders and neighbouring plants.
4. Communicate with the public through the CAER Program to discuss
 - hazards and programs that reduce risk
 - emergency response capability and
 - steps for personal safety.
5. Maintain a transition zone between heavy industry and sensitive land uses.

SHELTER-IN-PLACE

In Case of a Chemical Emergency

1. Go inside. Turn on local radio/TV. 
2. Close all windows and doors.
3. Turn off exhaust fans.
4. Listen to radio or TV for further instructions. Keep phone lines free.
5. If odour is strong, seal an inside room with wet towels at base of door. Breathe through a damp towel to filter air.

911 should be called only for emergencies.
